COLLECTIVE WORSHIP POLICY

Background

- Larkmead school vision:
 - "...equipped to succeed, making a real and positive difference in a demanding and changing world".

3. We wish to approach this in a way that meets educational needs, is of high quality, and is consistent with Larkmead's vision and ethos. Thus the aim is to move towards the legal requirement in a way that we would consider appropriate, even if there were no legal requirement

Proposed Approach

- 4. Collective worship is arranged by the Headteacher, having consulted the Governing Body.
- 5. Parents will be informed of the right to withdraw their children.
- 6. There will be at least one opportunity for collective worship per term (at least 6/ year).
- 7. These may be provided from the perspective of any of the major faith worldviews or of none, broadly reflective of the balance of worldviews locally and in the UK.
- 8. These may be incorporated as part of the whole school assemblies or by other means.
- 9. Approaches building on Larkmead's specialism in Visual and Performing Arts will be encouraged.
- 10. They may be developed in school or involve external faith or non-faith communities. Where external bodies are involved, they will be invited to build an activity through prior contact with the school, possibly involving prior preparation with students.
- 11. Collective worship will give opportunities for:
 - Celebration (they may link to major festivals such as Easter)
 - Pause for reflection
 - Community
 - Acknowledging the worth of the approach of different worldviews.

- 12. Collective worship will be characterised by:
 - Mutual respect
 - First hand contact with those of faith or non-faith communities
 - An opportunity for engagement

but will not pre-suppose or require agreement with the worldview.

Review

13. This approach was agreed by the Governing Body in November 2013 and will be reviewed in November 2016.
